Corridor Creation!

As you may be aware, all children have been working on a whole school project using different texts but a common theme of refugees. Over the past week, the teachers have been busy putting the children's work up in the corridor. The children are rightly proud of their work and we are very much looking forward to showing the corridor off to you over the coming weeks.

Planned Strike Action

As mentioned previously, the strike action is a complex and fast-moving situation, which requires the school to have obtained all the relevant information; guidance documents, legal considerations, local authority information and the intentions of the member staff (if they choose to share. They are entitled not to disclose their positon should they wish).



The schools response has to accord with the law and acknowledge ducation the responsibilities of the school whilst also acknowledging the legitimacy of the industrial action taking place.

Based on the facts provided to me, all year groups will be able to attend school as normal on the 1st February.

Please note that it should not be assumed that this will be the case for the remaining proposed strike days (Tuesday 28th February, Wednesday 15th and Thursday 16th March). These days will be handled individually and we will endeavour to communicate arrangements prior to the dates.

There is a lot of misunderstanding regarding the strike action, to explain more fully the reasoning behind the strike, and provide the answers to some questions you may have, I have included a FAQ at the end of this letter.

Strike Action FAQ

Please see the FAQ below. We wanted to provide you with some background behind the planned strike action, as we are aware that there is some confusion regarding the reasons for the strikes and the impact that there may be.

Why did NEU members vote to strike?

Teachers care strongly about children's education, and the NEU teacher members have voted to strike over the following:

- **Pay has fallen by 20% since 2010**. During this period teachers and school staff have consistently been asked to do 'more for less'
- When **pay awards** have been granted by the government it has **not been fully funded**. This means it has to be **taken from the schools existing budget creating more pressure on school finances**.
- Teacher retention is in crisis.
- Teacher workload has increased significantly over time.
- Funding for schools is under increasing pressure year on year. For all schools this means fewer support staff, fewer resources, reduced ability to maintain and repair buildings and teachers providing resources out of their own pocket (which all do on a regular basis).
- Funding to support the most vulnerable and those with special needs is insufficient.

If teachers strike, are they paid?

• No, teachers are not paid for strike days.

Based on current information, Christleton Primary School is likely to be open on the 1st February. Will this be the case for the other days as well?

• Each day will be treated separately, as teachers may make a different decision. It would be wise to consider your contingency plan should the school need to close in the future.

Why has the school not made the positon clearer earlier?

• The decision to strike is not taken lightly by any teacher. The decision is also a private one and one that they do not have to share should they wish not to. They also have the right to change their mind.

Rather than cause confusion or make assumptions the school has tried to provide information when the positon of the staff has been clear, whilst respecting the rights of the individual and meeting its legal requirements.







Why are some schools opening and some closing?

• Each school will be in a unique position depending on the number of teachers who are members of the NEU and those who choose to strike. Decisions therefore are made at the school level based on the number of staff indicating that they will be in, or those indicating that they may be on strike. The safety of the children is the key concern here, if there is not adequate staffing to ensure the safety of the children, then the school or class may be closed.

What about other unions?

- Other unions have balloted their members
- In the NASUWT most members voted in support of strike action (88.5%) but there was not the turnout required for the action to be valid.
- The NAHT also voted in support of strike action but again this was not the turnout required for the action to be valid. For this union the ballot took place via post and significant postal delays are being cited as a reason the threshold was not met.
